On June 28, 1969, the Stonewall Riots in New York City marked a turning point for the gay rights movement in the United States.

Although the gay rights movement predates Stonewall, Stonewall was the impetus for its gaining momentum through the 1970s, through the devasting AIDS crisis in the 1980s, into the 1990s, to today.
